

Mission and Overview

This is the eighteenth annual report of the merged agencies previously known as Spartanburg County SAFE (Shelter Available For Emergencies) Homes Network, Inc. and The Council on Sexual Assault. Implementation of the merger began in 1994 to become one organization: **SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition**.

The mission of SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition is to use our collective voice to address the impact of domestic and sexual violence by providing quality services to those affected and to create social change through education, training, and activism.

Vision

We envision a community liberated from all forms of domestic violence and sexual assault.

The initial transitional period for our new agency was aimed at an orderly consolidation of staff and programs, while at the same time maintaining an optimum level of both domestic violence and sexual assault services. The Union of the two sister agencies has proven to be a benefit to the victims we serve, as well as a sound financial decision. Many of our clients have been victims of both domestic violence and sexual assault. As a combined program, we are better able to address their concerns and ensure that appropriate services are received. We continue to evaluate our progress and implement changes that will improve or expand existing services.

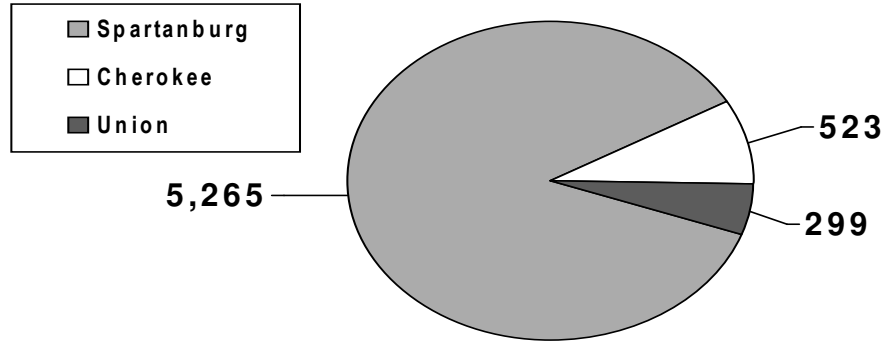

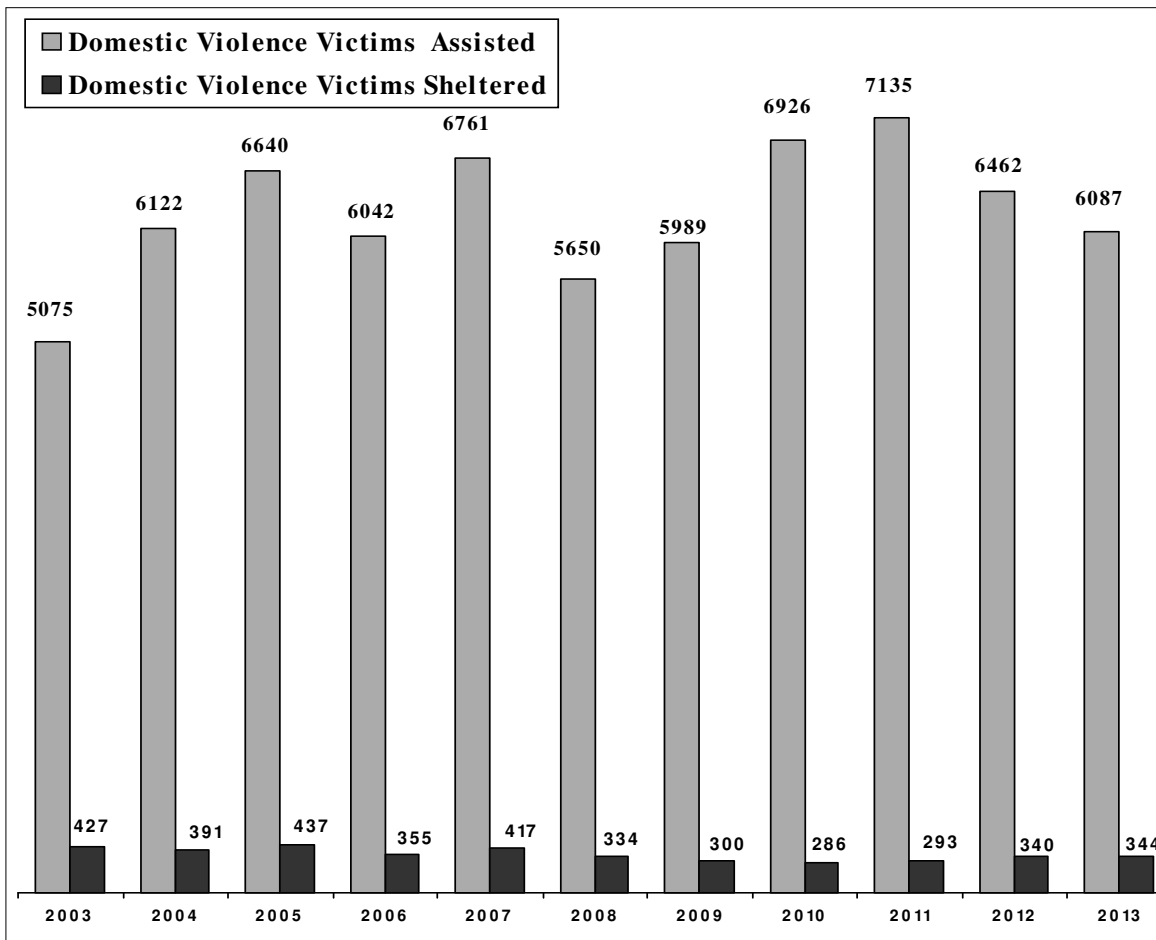
Statistics

We provided assistance to adult and child victims of domestic violence in 2013, which include crisis counseling, legal advocacy, and emergency shelter.



In 2013, 344 adults and children received 6,188 days of emergency shelter. We had an average length of stay of 18 days. The average age of the adults assisted in the shelter was 35 and the average age of the children was 6. Racially, 52% of the adults and children sheltered were Caucasian, 40% were African American, 4% were Hispanic, 3% were Bi-Racial, and 1% were Asian.

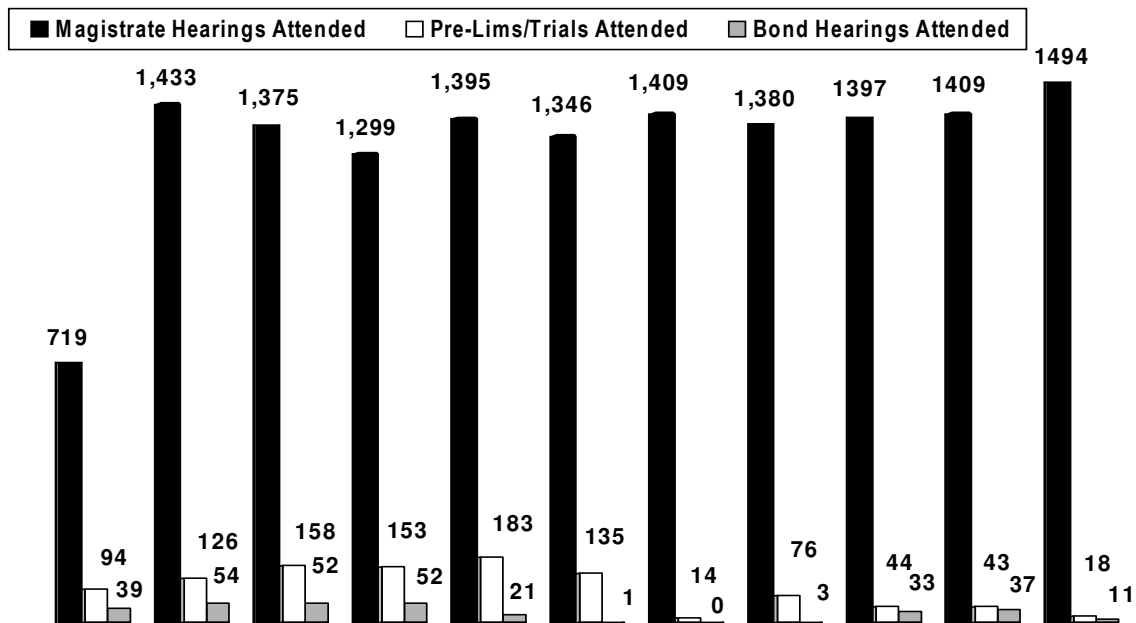
The following table displays domestic violence statistics 2003-2013.



During 2013, we assisted 453 victims with filing petitions for orders of protection and attended 2,147 hearings with domestic violence and sexual assault victims. We assisted 367 victims of sexual assault and accompanied 66 victims of sexual assault to hospitals in Spartanburg and Cherokee Counties.

The liaison with Law Enforcement Agencies resulted in 1,072 referrals of high-risk families — 963 from Spartanburg County, 99 from Cherokee County, and 10 from Union County. These high-risk families were provided follow-up contacts by volunteers and staff trained to assess the needs of such clients and offer referrals for appropriate additional services to reduce the negative effects of domestic violence.

Volunteers and staff provided victim advocacy for domestic violence victims at 1,494 city and county magistrate hearings, 12 preliminary hearings, 6 trials and 11 bond hearings. The following chart graphs magistrate hearings, pre-lims/trials, and bond hearings attended by our Criminal Court Advocacy Program since 2003.



We also assisted in filing 453 Domestic Violence Petitions. The following chart shows the numbers served by each county in 2013:

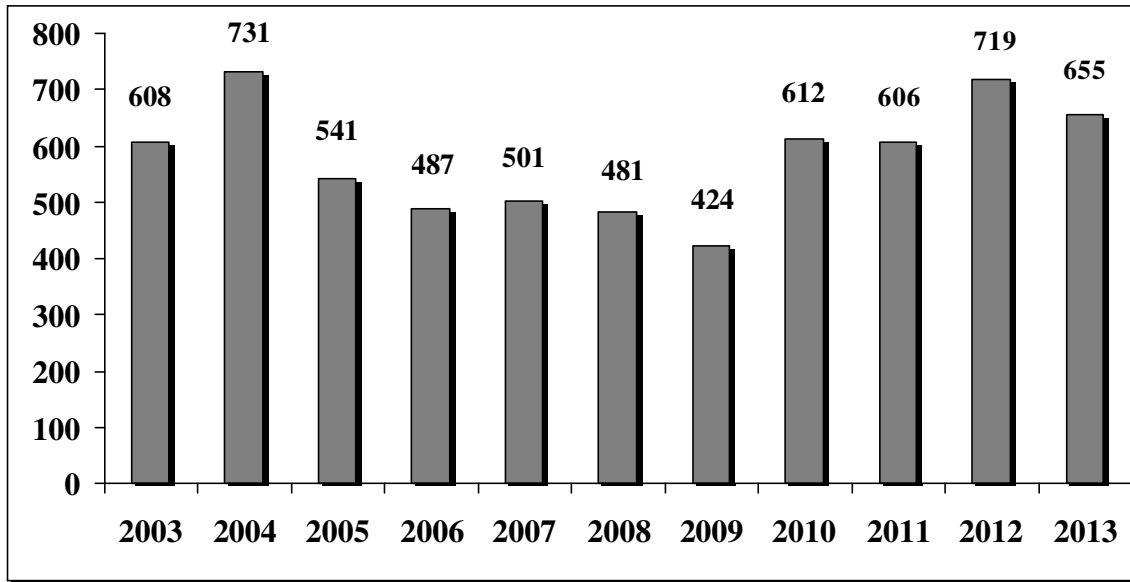
The number of sexual assault clients receiving services from the Coalition included 243 direct victims and 124 indirect victims (family members and friends). These services included hospital, police, and/or court accompaniment, crisis counseling, individual and/or group therapy, and information and referral. 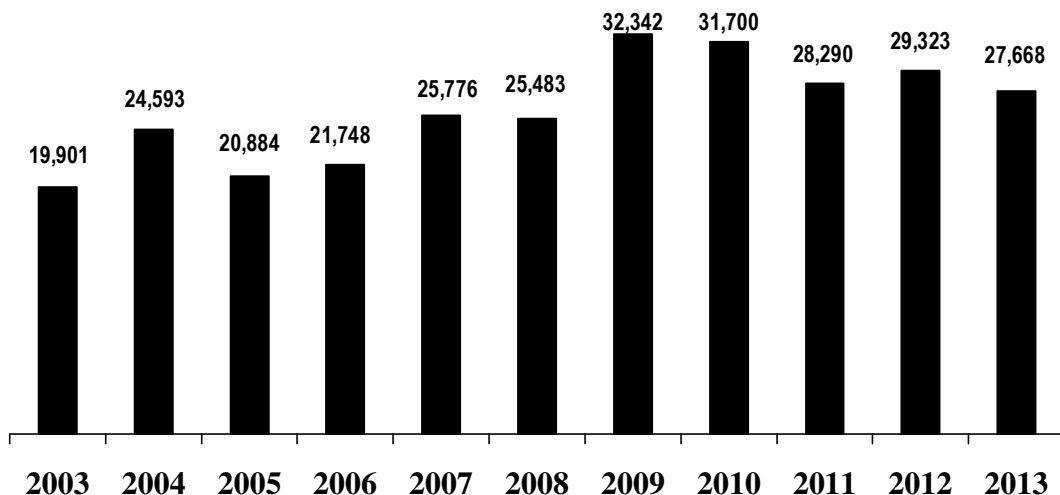

An estimated 117,342 people were reached through 655 education/prevention programs, presentations and media interviews relating to domestic violence and sexual assault, which raised awareness of the plight of victims of domestic and sexual violence. We reached 1,628 students through 71 school programs. We also provided education to underserved populations such as youth, elderly, disabled, and immigrant.



In 2013, SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition had an active volunteer base of 574 people who provide assistance in many capacities. These dedicated women, men and youth provided 27,667.75 hours of service, which is the equivalent of 13 staff positions. Without their commitment, it would be difficult to provide this level of quality services to our community. Each year our volunteers provide an outstanding level of service, as shown in the following chart:



Resource Development

The SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition program of services is supported through application and receipt of grants, most of which are awarded on a competitive basis. A total of \$1,475,511 was awarded and contributed for 2013 program purposes.

Following is a summary of grants awarded:

United Way of the Piedmont

A restricted grant was awarded by the United Way of the Piedmont which impacted the 2013 fiscal year. For January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013, we received \$159,700 from Program Review funds for our programs.

The United Ways of Cherokee and Union made unrestricted awards to support services to domestic violence victims. We received an award in the amount of \$7,420, from United Way of Cherokee, and \$6,500 from the United Way of Union for the period of January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013.

Spartanburg County Council

The Spartanburg County Council awarded a restricted grant for the support of the shelter in the amount of \$21,375 for the period of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013 and an additional grant of \$21,375 for the period of July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014.

Federal Emergency Management Agency

The Federal Emergency Management Agency made available \$7,500 for Spartanburg County and \$2,000 for Union County toward shelter operations for the period January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013.

City of Spartanburg Victims Assistance Funds

This project provides funding to hire part-time house managers at the shelter to work with victims on evenings and weekends. A total of \$20,000 was awarded for the period of October 1, 2012 to September 30, 2013.

Spartanburg City Community Development Block Grant

The City of Spartanburg awarded a grant to fund a part time domestic violence victim advocate to serve victims and their dependent children in the shelter. A total of \$5,950 was awarded for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013, and an additional \$5,950 was awarded for the period of July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014.

Victims Of Crime Act

The Victims Of Crime Act (VOCA) grant represents federal funding awarded through the State of South Carolina. SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition received six VOCA grants during the reporting period of July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014. These projects were continuation grants from the previous period July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. The following is a breakdown of the grants and funds received from each project:

Follow-Up/Outreach Coordinator: This project provides intensive follow-up services and outreach to underserved sexual assault victim populations in Spartanburg and Cherokee counties. A total of \$81,613 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$6,955 was received for the period, July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$76,504 was received for the period of August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This grant is currently in its nineteenth year of funding.

Legal Advocacy Coordinator: This project has provided an expansion and implementation of an advocacy and assistance program for victims seeking Orders of Protection and other services from Family and Criminal Court in Spartanburg, Cherokee, and Union counties. A total of \$59,857 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$4,630 was received for the period of July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$50,932 was received for the period of August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-second year of funding.

Victim Services Coordinator: This project provides direct services to victims of sexual violence and their families and friends. Responsibilities include crisis intervention, information and referral, hospital, police, and court accompaniment for victims in Spartanburg and Cherokee County. A total of \$65,417 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$5,653 was received for the period of July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$62,188 was received for the period of August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-third year of funding.

Shelter Services Program Coordinator: This project provides for an efficient and comprehensive liaison between service providers, and more effective shelter services to fill a gap in current service provision. A total of \$86,334 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$7,521 was received for the period of July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$82,733 was received for the period of August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-fourth year of funding.

Therapist/Outreach: This project provides funding for individual and group psychotherapy for sheltered and non-sheltered adult and child victims of domestic violence and outreach in Spartanburg, Cherokee, and Union County. A total of \$104,781 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$9,411 was received for the period of July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$103,526 was received for the period of August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This grant is currently in its nineteenth year of funding.

Sexual Assault/Abuse Therapist: This project provides for five part-time therapists to provide individual and group psychotherapy for child and adult victims of sexual assault/abuse in Spartanburg and Cherokee County. A total of \$90,959 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. An additional \$7,597 was received for the period of July 1, 2013 to July 31, 2013, and a total of \$83,562 was received for August 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014 for this project. This project is in its seventeenth year of funding.

Violence Against Women Act

Outreach Services to Union, Cherokee, and Spartanburg Counties: This project has combined the previous three funded VAWA projects into one project that will expand outreach services to Union, Cherokee and Spartanburg counties by providing crisis counseling, legal advocacy, case management and follow-up services, information and referrals, adult and child therapy, and education/prevention programs. A total of \$79,160 was received for the period of October 1, 2012 to September 30, 2013. An additional \$20,189 was received for the period of October 1, 2013 to March 31, 2014, and a total of \$58,971 was received for the period of October 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014. This grant is in its second year of funding.

State Victim's Assistance Program

Child Therapist: This project provides therapy services for child victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. A total of \$75,890 was received for the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013. During the period July 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014, a total of \$79,958 was received for this project. This grant is currently in its thirteenth year of funding.

South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC)

For the period July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2013, \$103,964 was awarded by DHEC to provide assistance to sexual assault victims. During the period of November 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013, \$26,662 was awarded for this project, and an additional \$129,656 was awarded for the period of July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014.

South Carolina Department of Social Services

Under the provisions of the State Spouse Abuse Legislation, \$216,851 was awarded for the period July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013 and \$216,851 for the period July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014. These funds support program administration, operational expenses, as well as, staffing at the Shelter. These funds are also available to assist families with transitional housing. Under a separate Food Grant we were reimbursed \$13,943 for food expenses for children in the shelter for the period January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013.

Federal Family Violence Prevention and Services Act

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, a restricted five year grant of \$50,000 per year was awarded for the period July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2017. These funds provide partial support for our Volunteer Coordinator, and our Children's Advocate. Additional funds in the amount of \$56,000 were provided for the period of October 1, 2013 to December 31, 2014 for this project.

United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

Emergency Shelter Grant Program: A HUD Emergency Shelter Grant of \$55,000 for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013 was secured for funding shelter operations and a full-time shelter counselor for the evening hours. An additional grant in the amount of \$45,718 was awarded for the period of July 20, 2013 to June 30, 2014.

Spartanburg Public Safety

Grants To Encourage Arrest Policies Grant: This project provides for an expansion of our professional training programs, victim advocacy programs with victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, and community collaboration through the use of Mary's House, an interdisciplinary resource center for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. A grant in the amount of \$257,604 was awarded for the period of September 1, 2011 to August 31, 2013. A prior grant funds extension in the amount of \$50,000 was awarded for the period of September 1, 2013 to May 31, 2014.

Mary Kay Foundation

The Mary Kay Foundation awarded \$20,000 for the period of November 1, 2012 to October 31, 2013 to be used to assist in the final phase of our new shelter. These funds will be used to help increase our capacity to serve victims by funding for key staff positions at the shelter, and increasing our bed space from 42 to 54 beds.

Mary Black Foundation

The Mary Black Foundation awarded \$35,000 for the period of December 1, 2013 to November 30, 2014 to fund staff dedicated to providing sexual assault, domestic violence/dating violence, and stalking prevention, outreach and crisis response for college students and young adults.
