Mission and Overview

This is the twentieth annual report of the merged agencies previously known as Spartanburg County SAFE (Shelter Available For Emergencies) Homes Network, Inc. and The Council on Sexual Assault. Implementation of the merger began in 1994 to become one organization: **SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition**.

The mission of SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition is to use our collective voice to address the impact of domestic and sexual violence by providing quality services to those affected and to create social change through education, training, and activism.

Vision

We envision a community liberated from all forms of domestic violence and sexual assault.

The initial transitional period for our new agency was aimed at an orderly consolidation of staff and programs, while at the same time maintaining an optimum level of both domestic violence and sexual assault services. The Union of the two sister agencies has proven to be a benefit to the victims we serve, as well as a sound financial decision. Many of our clients have been victims of both domestic violence and sexual assault. As a combined program, we are better able to address their concerns and ensure that appropriate services are received. We continue to evaluate our progress and implement changes that will improve or expand existing services.

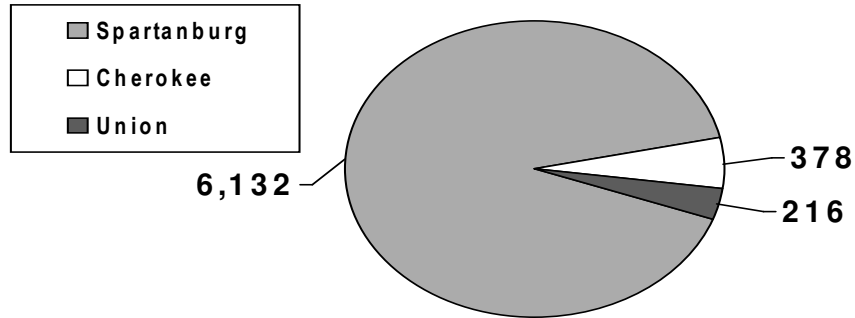

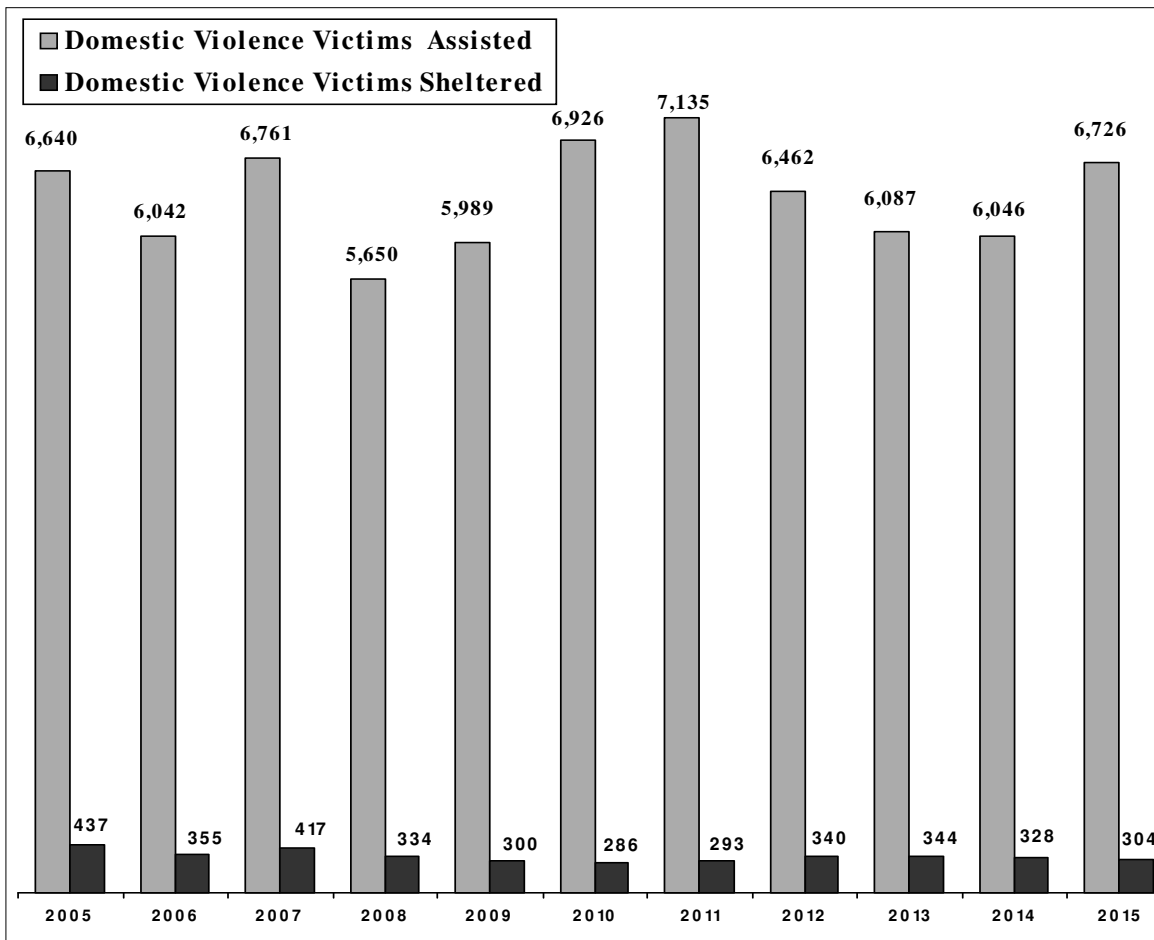
Statistics

We provided assistance to adult and child victims of domestic violence in 2015, which include crisis counseling, legal advocacy, and emergency shelter.



In 2015, 304 adults and children received 7,945 days of emergency shelter. We had an average length of stay of 26 days. The average age of the adults assisted in the shelter was 37 and the average age of the children was 6. Racially, 44% of the adults and children sheltered were Caucasian, 37% were African American, 8% were Bi-Racial, 7% were Hispanic, and 3% were Asian.

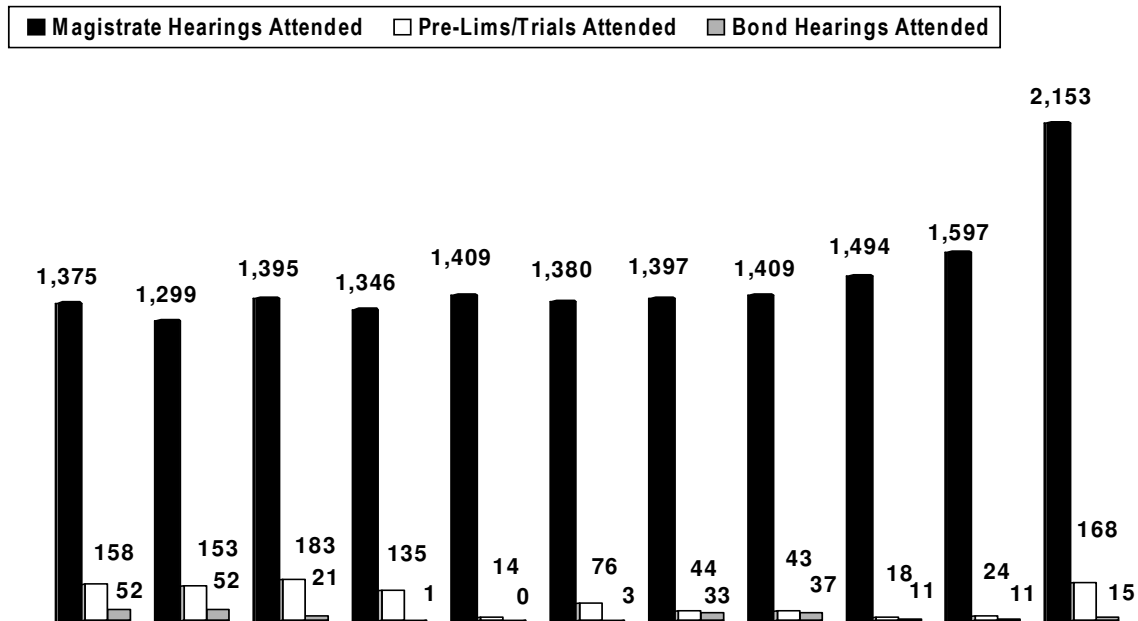
The following table displays domestic violence statistics 2005-2015.



During 2015, we assisted 408 victims with filing petitions for orders of protection and attended 2,883 hearings with domestic violence and sexual assault victims. We assisted 366 victims of sexual assault and accompanied 116 victims of sexual assault to hospitals in Spartanburg and Cherokee Counties.

The liaison with Law Enforcement Agencies resulted in 1,237 referrals of high-risk families — 1,024 from Spartanburg County, 147 from Cherokee County, and 66 from Union County. These high-risk families were provided follow-up contacts by volunteers and staff trained to assess the needs of such clients and offer referrals for appropriate additional services to reduce the negative effects of domestic violence.

Volunteers and staff provided victim advocacy for domestic violence victims at 2,153 city and county magistrate hearings, 120 preliminary hearing, 48 trials and 15 bond hearings. The following chart graphs magistrate hearings, pre-lims/trials, and bond hearings attended by our Criminal Court Advocacy Program since 2005.



We also assisted in filing 408 Domestic Violence Petitions. The following chart shows the numbers served by each county in 2015:

The number of sexual assault clients receiving services from the Coalition included 219 direct victims and 147 indirect victims (family members and friends). These services included hospital, police, and/or court accompaniment, crisis counseling, individual and/or group therapy, and information and referral. The following statistics refer to the number of sexual assault victims and indirect victims served by county.

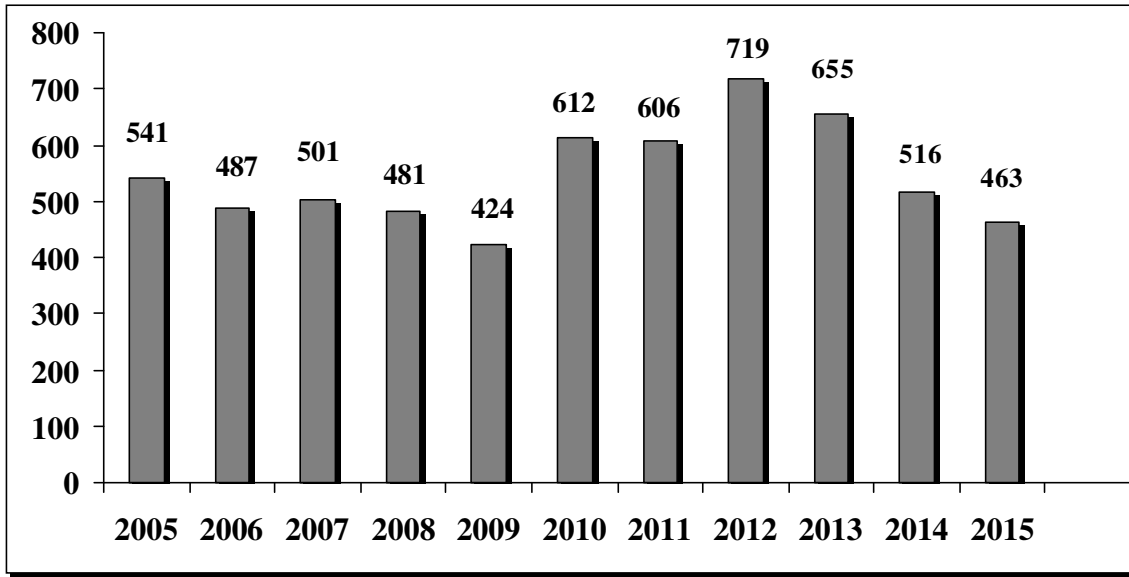

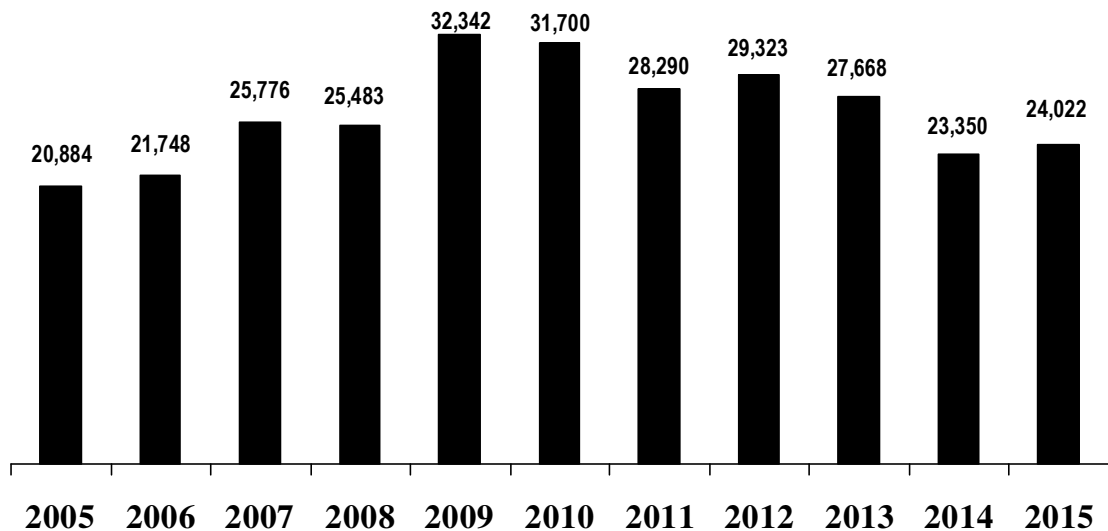

An estimated 171,558 people were reached through 463 education/prevention programs, presentations and media interviews relating to domestic violence and sexual assault, which raised awareness of the plight of victims of domestic and sexual violence. We reached 2,662 students through 133 school programs. We also provided education to underserved populations such as youth, elderly, disabled, and immigrant.



In 2015, SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition had an active volunteer base of 623 people who provide assistance in many capacities. These dedicated women, men and youth provided 24,021.75 hours of service, which is the equivalent of 12 staff positions. Without their commitment, it would be difficult to provide this level of quality services to our community. Each year our volunteers provide an outstanding level of service, as shown in the following chart:



Resource Development

The SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition program of services is supported through application and receipt of grants, most of which are awarded on a competitive basis. A total of \$1,576,269 was awarded and contributed for 2015 program purposes.

Following is a summary of grants awarded:

United Way of the Piedmont

A restricted grant was awarded by the United Way of the Piedmont which impacted the 2015 fiscal year. For January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015, we received \$158,866 from Program Review funds for our programs.

The United Ways of Cherokee and Union made unrestricted awards to support services to domestic violence victims. We received an award in the amount of \$13,300, from United Way of Cherokee, and \$6,866 from the United Way of Union for the period of January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015.

Spartanburg County Council

The Spartanburg County Council awarded a restricted grant for the support of the shelter in the amount of \$21,375 for the period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015 and an additional grant of \$21,375 for the period of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016.

Spartanburg City Community Development Block Grant

The City of Spartanburg awarded a grant to fund a part time domestic violence victim advocate to serve victims and their dependent children in the shelter. A total of \$5,950 was awarded for the period of July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, and an additional \$7,000 was awarded for the period of October 20, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

Spartanburg Public Safety

Grants To Encourage Arrest Policies Grant: This project provides for an expansion of our professional training programs, victim advocacy programs with victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, and community collaboration through the use of Mary's House, an interdisciplinary resource center for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. A grant in the amount of \$248,306 was awarded for the period of October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2017.

Victims Of Crime Act

The Victims Of Crime Act (VOCA) grant represents federal funding awarded through the State of South Carolina. SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition received six VOCA grants during the reporting period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016. These projects were continuation grants from the previous period that were extended to include the period of July 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015. The following is a breakdown of the grants and funds received from each project:

Follow-Up/Outreach Coordinator: This project provides intensive follow-up services and outreach to underserved sexual assault victim populations in Spartanburg and Cherokee counties. A total of \$71,672 was received for the period of July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$23,516 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$116,199 was received for the period October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-first year of funding.

Legal Advocacy Coordinator: This project has provided an expansion and implementation of an advocacy and assistance program for victims seeking Orders of Protection and other services from Family and Criminal Court in Spartanburg, Cherokee, and Union counties. A total of \$49,509 was received for the period of October 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$15,953 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$74,130 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-fourth year of funding.

Victim Services Coordinator: This project provides direct services to victims of sexual violence and their families and friends. Responsibilities include crisis intervention, information and referral, hospital, police, and court accompaniment for victims in Spartanburg and Cherokee County. A total of \$57,519 was received for the period of October 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$19,049 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$129,482 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-fifth year of funding.

Shelter Services Program Coordinator: This project provides for an efficient and comprehensive liaison between service providers, and more effective shelter services to fill a gap in current service provision. A total of \$78,820 was received for the period of October 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$25,848 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$193,057 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016 for this project. This grant is currently in its twenty-sixth year of funding.

Therapist/Outreach: This project provides funding for individual and group psychotherapy for sheltered and non-sheltered adult and child victims of domestic violence and outreach in Spartanburg, Cherokee, and Union County. A total of \$83,619 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$27,023 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$146,381 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016. This grant is currently in its twenty-first year of funding.

Sexual Assault/Abuse Therapist: This project provides for part-time therapists to provide individual and group psychotherapy for child and adult victims of sexual assault/abuse in Spartanburg and Cherokee County. A total of \$76,795 was received for the period of October 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, with an amended award of \$24,873 to extend the original grant end date to September 30, 2015. An additional award of \$24,873 was received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016 for this project. This project is in its nineteenth year of funding.

Violence Against Women Act

Outreach Services to Union, Cherokee, and Spartanburg Counties: This project provides outreach services to Union, Cherokee and Spartanburg counties by providing crisis counseling, legal advocacy, case management and follow-up services, information and referrals, adult and child therapy, and education/prevention programs. A total of \$77,278 was received for the period of December 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015. Two additional awards were received for the period of October 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016. The first award in the amount of \$40,000, and an additional award in the amount of \$55,734. This grant is in its fourth year of funding.

State Victim's Assistance Program

Child Therapist: This project provides therapy services for child victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. A total of \$87,924 was received for the period of July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015. During the period July 1, 2015 to September 30, 2016, a total of \$95,348 was received for this project. This grant is currently in its fifteenth year of funding.

South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC)

For the period July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015, \$122,003 was awarded by DHEC to provide assistance to sexual assault victims. An additional award of \$128,360 was awarded for the period of July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016 for sexual assault victims.

**South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control
(DHEC)**

A one time non-recurring state domestic violence allocation in the amount of \$35,714.28 was received on November 3, 2015. These funds, distributed through DHEC will be used to fund a portion of the salaries of employees answering the 24 hour crisis line, shelter victim advocacy and education programs for local colleges in the community.

South Carolina Department of Social Services

Under the provisions of the State Spouse Abuse Legislation, \$219,851 was awarded for the period July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 and \$219,851 for the period July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016. These funds support program administration, operational expenses, as well as, staffing at the Shelter. These funds are also available to assist families with transitional housing. Under a separate Food Grant we were reimbursed \$21,331 for food expenses for children in the shelter for the period January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015.

Federal Family Violence Prevention and Services Act

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, a restricted five year grant of \$82,867 per year was awarded for the period November 3, 2014 to September 30, 2015. These funds provide partial support for our Volunteer Coordinator, Legal Advocate, Children's Advocate, and our part time Victim Advocate staff at the shelter. This funding also provides operational support for the shelter that includes utilities, food, maintenance, and other supplies needed for the shelter. Additional funds in the amount of \$84,258 were provided for the period of November 3, 2015 to June 30, 2016 for this project.

United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

Emergency Shelter Grant Program: A HUD Emergency Shelter Grant of \$52,242 for the period July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015 was secured for funding shelter operations and a full-time shelter counselor for the evening hours. An additional grant in the amount of \$54,904 was awarded for the period of July 20, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

Federal Emergency Management Agency

The Federal Emergency Management Agency made available \$7,000 for Spartanburg County, \$2,181 for Union County, and \$1,000 for Cherokee County toward shelter operations for the period January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.
